Quimper vase in the shape of a spinning top decorated with Breton dancers. Signed under the base: Henriot Quimper. Jim E. Sévellec 20th century Jim E Sévellec was a French painter and earthenware maker (1897-1971). He was the father of the artist Ronan-Jim Sevellec. Eugène Sévellec grew up in Camaret-sur-Mer with the artistic colony of the entourage of the writer Saint-Pol-Roux. At a very young age, he drew life in the port. Under the influence of Saint-Pol-Roux, he left for Paris to pursue artistic training with Louis-Marie Désiré-Lucas. During the First World War, he was mobilized in 1916 in the infantry and served, among other things, as an interpreter for American and Scottish soldiers. This is how his companions gave him his artist first name "Jim", easier to pronounce than that of
