Historical and technical context Aquatint is an etching technique that creates nuances of tone, reminiscent of a watercolor drawing. The technique was popularized in the 18th century, and Louthembourg, although best known for his work as a painter, brilliantly exploited the method to translate his compositions into engravings. ### Philippe-Jacques de Louthembourg Born in 1740 in Germany and working primarily in France and England, Louthembourg was a painter of landscapes, maritime scenes, and a theater set designer.
