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6 route de Melun Crécy La Chapelle 77580 Louis XV, he was one of the suppliers of the Court. From his factory in the cloister of Saint-Germain-L'auxerrois, Jean-Baptiste I Tuart delivered numerous orders to Menus-Plaisirs from 1744 to 1753. He had a son, Jean-Baptiste II Tuart, with whom he worked for a time until the latter decided to establish himself as a master table-maker and merchant. Tuart probably collaborated with his fellow merchant Léonard Boudin, who left his stamp near his on several occasions. His work is characterized by classical Louis XV style furniture. He thus created chests of drawers, corner cabinets, flat and sloped desks, and secretaires, in veneered wood or in floral marquetry. Some pieces of furniture were also executed in lacquer or varnish in the Chinese style. Alongside these pieces of furniture, Tuart created Transitional pieces such as small drum tables or chests of drawers with projections, inlaid with small landscapes and utensils in the manner of Topino.
