Beautiful Sauteuse Commode Louis XV period signature Charles Chevallier (1700 -1771) Charles CHEVALLIER (1700 - 1771) known as the Young, Paris. received master before 1738. "Brother of cabinetmaker Jean Mathieu Chevallier and son-in-law of cabinetmaker Gaspard Coulon, Charles Chevallier received his master's degrees before 1738 and settled in rue du Bac. His production of very fine Louis XV and Transition furniture. quickly acquired a great notoriety.He is moreover quoted in 1769, in "the Almanach of Indication or of the True merit" like one of the principal craftsmen of cabinetmaking. His works in veneers in leaves are decorated with floral or geometric designs, Chinese lacquers or European varnishes as confirmed by the inventory drawn up in his store

after his death, which mentions a large number of furniture "of Indian wood with flowers"... "Lacquer and lacquer style." It is thought that the works of Charles Chevallier were not very numerous. We can however point out an adorable ragpicker in rosewood from the castle of Hénonville en Beauvaisis or a small secretary Transition also e n rosewood, with pretty floral marquetry. He is also cited in 1769, in the "Almanac d'Indication ou du Vrai mérit" as one of the main cabinetmaking craftsmen. His works in leaf veneers are adorned with floral inlays or geometric designs, Chinese lacquers or European varnishes as confirmed by the inventory drawn up in his store after his death, which mentions a large number of furniture "made of Indian wood. with flowers "..." lacquer and lacquer style ". It is believed that the works of Charles Chevallier were not very numerous. We can however point out an adorable rosewood chest of drawers from the Château d'Hénonville en Beauvaisis or a small Transition secretary also in rosewood, with pretty floral marquetry.
