François Nardi was a young self-taught painter from Toulon when he was noticed by Frédéric Montenard who gave him advice and encouraged him to go to Paris. After a stint at the Académie Julian (1887-1889) and the exhibition of his works at the Salon of French artists, he quickly experienced success that transcended borders with his landscapes of the Mediterranean and Provence. At the outset, he had similarities with Claude Monet, his contemporary, but did not seem to suffer much from the pictorial

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movements of his time. He nevertheless remains in a line close to the Impressionists. At the height of his art, setbacks of fortune distanced him from Paris and the art world and prevented him from continuing the brilliant career he had led until then.
